Defending our Faith with the Truth By Father Dennis M. Gordon, FSSP

The Great Flood

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...scientists do say that at

one time all the continents

we know today were sub-

merged under the oceans.

Question: "Let's talk about Noah and the flood. Was it a world-wide flood or was it just a flood in that region—what does the Bible and science say?"

nswer: "Let's take a look..."The detailed account of the flood during Noah's time, including a month-and-day timeline, is given in the first book of the Bible, the Book of Genesis, chapters 7-8. In there we find this account of how extensive

the flood was: 'The rain fell upon the earth forty days and forty nights' (Genesis 7:12), and 'the waters prevailed upon the earth a hundred and fifty days' (Genesis 7:23).


"Did it truly cover the whole earth? This is what the Book of Genesis tells us; the flood waters 'filled all on the face of the earth' (Genesis 7:18). Not only that, but the Bible adds that 'the waters prevailed beyond measure upon the earth: and all the high mountains under the whole heaven were covered' (Genesis 7:19). Notice that it says that ALL the high mountains, under the whole heaven, were covered. This means a total covering with water of the entire earth ('under the whole heaven'). "There is also this detail added: 'The water was fifteen cubits higher than the mountains it covered' (Genesis 7:20). A cubit is between 18-21 inches, depending on whether the cubit being referred to was a regular cubit or a long cubit. So, fifteen cubits at 18 -21 inches per cubit means that the flood water was at least over 20 feet higher than the mountains. In **Genesis 8:5** we read the following: 'And the waters were going and decreasing until the tenth month: for in the tenth month, on the first day of the month, the tops of the mountains appeared.' The tenth month is the tenth month since the beginning of the flood, for the timeline starts at the beginning of the rains in

Genesis 7:11. The waters, then, prevailed over the earth for 150 days, and then began decreasing. They decreased until the tenth month when finally the 'tops of the mountains appeared.' This, then, has to be a world-wide flood. If this were just a regional flood in

the Middle East, then *that* would be a miracle indeed—that the waters of a *regional* flood could swell up to over 20 feet higher than the mountains, and then *keep* covering those mountains *for ten months* without running off.

"Where did all that water come from? Not only did it rain for 40 days and 40 nights, but **Genesis** 7:11 adds that 'the fountains of the great deep were broken up' indicating water breaking out from under the earth.

"Does science have anything to say on it? Interestingly, scientists *do* say that at one time all the continents we know today *were* submerged under the oceans. They say this because there is boundless evidence that the continents were once submerged under water. Scientists also say that there are massive reservoirs of water that are still in the Earth's mantle, underground. It was a great amount of these waters that were released during the great, world-wide flood of Noah's time."

N THE FEAST OF THE IMMACULATE CONCEPTION OF THE VIRGIN MOTHER OF GOD, we celebrate the joyful first rays of that great day of mercy, the Nativity of Our Savior Jesus Christ. Mary's Divine Son, the eternal God, from the first moment of her being, considered the sublime dignity to which he had decreed to raise her, and distinguished her in a manner suitable to

distinguisned ner in a manner suitable to

bear the relation to him of mother.

To understand the greatness to which Almighty God wished to raise his very own Blessed Mother, consider how, when He commanded a temple to be built to his honour in Jerusalem, what preparations he ordained! What purity he required in the things that belonged to that work, even in the persons and materials that were employed in it! What consecrations, rites, and ceremonies did he order to sanctify all the parts of the building! And this for a material temple, in which the ark of the old covenant was to be placed, where men were to offer their homages and sacrifices to his adorable Majesty according to the Mosaic Law.

What then did he not do for the Blessed Virgin Mary in spiritually adorning her, whose chaste womb was to be his living tabernacle, from whose pure flesh he was to derive his own most holy body, and of whom he would himself be born! If the Ark of the Covenant, holding the word of God written on stones, was worthy of such dignity, of how much greater dignity was worth the Ark of the New Covenant, Blessed Mary, holding the Living Word of God, written, as it were, in human flesh?

Consider how carefully a skilled artist, in the first place, examines that there be no irregularity or deformity in the piece which he is going to carve. And if a house is to be put in order and adorned, to receive some guest of great distinction, the first thing is to remove all filth, whatever might be offensive. Clearly then, was Almighty God pleased to preserve

this holy Virgin from contracting any stain

of sin, whether original or actual!

To have been one moment infected with sin was not agreeable to the undefiled purity of her who was chosen to be ever holy, that she might be worthy to bring forth the author of sanctity. Had she ever been in sin, notwithstanding the advantages of her other privileges and graces, she would have been for that moment before she was cleansed, the object of his indignation and just hatred. St. Augustin thought this reason sufficient for exempting her, whenever mention is made of sin. "Out of reverence," says he, "and for the honour which is due to her Son, I will have no

question put about her when we speak of

any sin."

Christ was no less her Redeemer, Reconciler, and most perfect Saviour and Benefactor, by preserving her from this stain, than he would have been by cleansing her from it; as by descending from Adam she was liable to this debt, and would have contracted the contagion, had she not been preserved from it through the grace and merits of her Son.

The grace which exempted Mary from original sin, preserved her also from the sting of concupiscence,

or inordinate love of creatures, and tendency to evil. The first sin of Adam brought on us a deluge of evils, and by the two wounds of ignorance and concupiscence, has spread its toxic influence over all the powers of our soul. Through it our understanding is liable to be deceived, and to be led away with errors; our will is prone to give in to the desires of the basest passions: our senses are become inlets of dangerous suggestions: we are subjected to spiritual weakness, inconstancy, and vanity, and are tyrannized over by inordinate appetites. Hence proceeds in us a difficulty in doing good, a repugnance to our duties, a proneness to evil, the poisoned charm of vice, and the internal war of the flesh against the spirit. All this we experience and groan under; yet under the weight of such miseries, by a much greater evil, we are blind, proud, and insensible. We must never cease sighing to the Blessed Virgin, who by God's grace was spared these evils, and to implore her aid against our enemy, and never enter into any truce with sin.

Who is she that cometh forth as the morning rising, fair as the moon, bright as the sun, terrible as an army set in array! (Cant. 6:9) These words we may understand as spoken by the angels at the first glorious appearance of the Mother of God, astonished to behold her, after the dismal night of darkness and sin, as the morning rising, beautiful as the moon,



shining as the sun, decked with the brightest ornaments of grace, and terrible to all the powers of hell, as the face of an army drawn up in battalia, displaying her beams on the horizon of the earth, which had been hitherto covered with the hideous deformity of sin.

What a glorious spectacle, what a subject of joy was it to the heavenly spirits, to see the empire of sin broken, and a descendant of Adam come forth free from the general contagion of his race, making her appearance pure, holy, and beautiful, richly adorned with the most precious gifts of grace, and outshining the highest angels and cherubims! Shall we refuse to her our admiration and praises? Shall we not offer to God our best homages in thanksgiving for such a mercy, and for so great a present which he has bestowed on the world in Mary?

The Immaculate Conception of the holy Mother of God was not only in itself a great and glorious mystery, but likewise joyful to mankind. Certain glimmerings of man's redemption were seen by the patriarchs and prophets of the old law, in several types and figures; and these distant visions filled them with joy. But the Conception of Mary was no mere glimmering, but indeed may be said to have been its rising morning, or the dawning of its day. She was the Throne and the Tabernacle of the true Solomon, and the Ark of the Testament, to contain, not corruptible manna, but the Author of the incorruptible life of our souls.

O Mother of Mercy let your happy privilege, your exemption from all sin and concupiscence, inspire you with pity for our miseries: and by your spotless purity and abundant graces, obtain for us strength against all our dangers, the deliverance from all our evils, and the most powerful remedies of divine grace. Thus, from this mystery, we are to draw lessons of instruction for ourselves!



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
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
