Christ Reveals His Divinity in Mark:10

"Let's read the whole incident in question lowing the old Law of God itself is to follow from Mark 10:17-21, to get the context: 'A certain man running up and kneeling before him, asked him, Good Master, what shall I do that I may receive life everlasting? And Jesus said to him, <u>Why callest thou me good? None is good</u> but the one God. Thou knowest the commandments: Do not commit adultery, do not kill, do not steal, bear not false witness, do no fraud, honor thy father and mother. But he answering, said to him: Master, all these things I have observed from my youth. And Jesus looking on him, loved him, and said to him: One thing is wanting unto thee: go, sell whatsoever thou hast, and give to the poor, and thou shalt have self is good, a good beyond the commandments, treasure in heaven; and come, follow me.'

"In this event, the young man calls Our Lord good, and then Christ puts special emphasis on that comment, asking the young man to consider *why* it was that he calls Christ *good*. Our Lord emphasizes that goodness is from God alone, or ity, Our Lord is saying to the young man in Mark even more, that only God is good.

"Then he says to the man what he must do for eternal life, pointing him to <u>the commandments</u>, the Law of Almighty God Himself in the old covenant. When the man says that he has kept **all** the commandments, Our Lord looks on him with

If Our Lord did not believe that He Himself was good, why would He tell the young man to follow *Him* (*'come, follow*) Me'), especially when to follow Christ is the 'one *thing* [that] *is wanting* after one has kept *all* the commandments, which are themselves good?
