Apologetics Corner

Defending our Faith with the Truth By Father Dennis M. Gordon, FSSP

Who Actually Wrote the Gospels?

Question: "Some 'wise guy' said that the Scriptures couldn't have been written by the Apostles, since they were just fishermen who must John was known enough to the high priest to be have been illiterate. How do I answer him?" let into his house and known well enough even

Answer: "Well, that 'wise guy' must not be familiar with the Gospel writers, nor how the Gospels were written. They were written in Greek, by the way, with the exception of St. Matthew's, which was written in Hebrew. Let's go in order of the Gospels to answer this 'wise guy's' objection.

"First there is the Gospel of St. Matthew. Was St. Matthew an illiterate fisherman? Hardly! St. Matthew was a tax collector (as we know from <u>Matthew 9:9</u>) so he *had* to know how to write. He collected taxes in Galilee, which was an international crossroads on the northern edge of Israel, and it is very likely that he had to know *several* languages in order to collect taxes in this area from people of various nations.

"Second is the Gospel of St. Mark. St. Mark was not an illiterate fisherman, he was a Gentile; the companion of St. Peter on his missionary journeys, reliable enough that he was a companion of the Apostle on his missionary journeys. As a Gentile, he would have known Greek, so of course he was able to write this Gospel in Greek.

"Third is the Gospel of St. Luke. St. Luke was also a Gentile and we *know* that he was educated. We know this because he was a physician, as St. Paul in <u>Colossians 4:14</u> tells us in passing; '*Luke, the most dear physician, salutes you: and Demas*'. When was the last time you met a physician that couldn't write?

"The last Gospel is St. John's. It's true that St. John was working as a fisherman when he was called by Our Lord. Still, St. John may have been of the upper class of Jewish society because of a little detail he gives in his Gospel; that he was let in to the very courtyard of the high priest, his very home, because he '*was known to the high priest*' (John 18:15). He also used this in-

fluence to get St. Peter admitted into the courtyard also, as the next verse tells us. Since St. John was known enough to the high priest to be let into his house and known well enough even to get St. John's friend (St. Peter) into the high priest's house, it is very likely that St. John was of the upper class of Jerusalem and would have been therefore an educated man.

"Nonetheless, even if St. John was just an uneducated fisherman, it is certainly possible that he and these other Gospel writers used scribes to whom they dictated their Gospels, for this practice was common in that time, as we know from St. Paul's own use of scribes, who wrote letters that he dictated (for an example of this see <u>Romans 16:22</u>). St. Paul used these scribes even though he himself could certainly write, being widely known as a well-educated Pharisee before his conversion.

"So, the objection of your friend, the 'wise guy', is not really well-founded; nor does it succeed in finding for him a reason for doubting the authenticity of the Gospels as being truly written by Matthew, Mark, Luke and John."
