Apologetics Corner

Defending our Faith with the Truth By Father Dennis M. Gordon, FSSP

More prayers to the Saints

Question: "I want to return to the notion of 'praying praise of all His saints.' (King James Version). I cite this is good?"

Answer: "There is! Consider these things:

"The Psalms are the quintessential prayers of the Bible, so much so that in her most faithful days, Israel prayed these prayers (the Psalms) every day in the Temple. The Psalms were the only public prayers that Israel, as part of her *public worship*, prayed every day. Yet are you aware that there are Psalms, for example, Psalms 145-150 [or 146-150, in some bibles], in which these inspired praises of God crescendo and culminate, don't even speak words to God at all? On the contrary, each of these Psalms, these prayers, although not speaking to God, instead address His people!

"Here are some examples:

"Psalm 150:1, 5: 'Praise ye the Lord in His holy places: praise ye him in the firmament of His power... Let every spirit praise the Lord.' In this prayer, it is clear that souls <u>in heaven</u> are being addressed, since it addresses those 'in the firmament of His power... Let every spirit praise its of the just in heaven in prayer, in fact, it is a Biblical custom!

"Psalm 149:1, 3, 9: 'Sing ye to the Lord a new canticle... Let them praise His name in choir: let them sing to Him... This glory is to all the saints.' In this prayer, each of these words are addressed to angels or men; not to God.

"Psalm 148:1-2: 'Praise ye the Lord from the heavens: praise ye Him in the high places. Praise ye Him, all His angels: praise ye Him all His hosts.' Again, each of the words in this part of the prayer are addressed to <u>all His</u> angels and all His armies (hosts), and not to God. The rest of the Psalm doesn't address words to God at all. Again, it's no problem, Biblically speaking, to address the angels and saints of God in prayer.

"On top of that, this Psalm ends with the words, 'He hath exalted the horn of His people: a hymn to all His saints.' (Psalm 148:14). Other versions have this verse as follows: 'He also exalteth the horn of His people, the

Now, the horn, as all scriptural commentators agree, is a Biblical symbol of *strength*. So, this verse, in whatever version you read, is calling the 'praise of all His saints', including those in heaven, the **strength** of His people.

> "Likewise, in Psalms 145-147 [146-147] - these Psalms don't actually speak any words to God, but they do speak to His faithful ones, calling on them to praise Him. And there are many other examples like this we could cite throughout the Psalms and elsewhere, where the faithful are addressed in prayer and God isn't called upon at all: Psalms 99, 112, 116, 135, [100, 113, 117, 136], and 1 Paralipomenon [Chronicles] 16:8-36.

> "In the following Psalms, most of the Psalm is speaking to His faithful ones, while God is addressed directly very little: Psalm 32, 117, 134.

> "Other prayers in the Bible or Psalms have verses that speak to 'the heavens' or 'those who fear the Lord', 'ye just', or 'ye saints': Psalm 21:24, Psalm 29:5, Psalm 96:12, Isaiah 44:23, Isaiah 49:13.

This acclamation/prayer is not telling God to praise Him-So, Biblically speaking, it's no problem to address the spir-self; it is instead a call for all to express praise to the Lord - it is addressed to *His creatures!* So, anyone who uses this expression of praise in prayer – Alleluia – is actually addressing an exclamatory prayer to others, and not to God! Of course, it is not meant to give praise to others, but the point is that this most common of all Christian prayers shows that it is a good thing, a Biblical custom, to exclaim the praise **of God**, through addressing others.

> "So, by addressing angels or saints in heaven in our prayer, are we adoring them? Not at all! It is just showing by example that in the inspired, quintessential prayers of Bible, the Psalms, and other prayers in the Bible, it is <u>no</u> problem and in fact it is a Biblical custom to address the spirits of the just in heaven in prayer!

Heart of Jesus Christ with its natural meaning, it is both lawful and fitting for us, supported by Christian faith, to mount not only to its love as perceived by the senses but also higher, to a consideration and adoration of the infused heavenly love; and finally, by a movement of the soul at once sweet and sublime, to reflection on, and adoration of, the divine love of the Word Incarnate. We do so since, in accordance with the faith by which we believe that both natures — the human and the divine — are united in the Person of Christ, we can grasp in our minds those most intimate ties which unite the love of feeling of the physical Heart of Jesus with that twofold spiritual love, namely, the human and the divine love. For these loves must be spoken of not only as existing side by side in the adorable Person of the divine Redeemer but also as being linked together by a natural bond insofar as the human love, including that of the feelings, is subject to the divine and, in due proportion, provides us with an image of the latter. We do not pretend, however, that we must contemplate and adore in the Heart of Jesus what is called the formal image, that is to say, the perfect and absolute symbol of His divine love, for no created image is capable of adequately expressing the essence of this love. But a Christian in paying honor along with the Church to the Heart of Jesus is adoring the symbol and, as it were, the visible sign of the divine charity which went Word made Flesh, the human race stained with so many sins.

105. It is therefore essential, at this point, in a doctrine of such importance and requiring such prudence that each one constantly hold that the truth of the natural symbol by which the physical Heart of Jesus is related to the Person of the Word, entirely depends upon the fundamental truth of the hypostatic union. Should anyone declare this to be untrue he would be reviving false opinions, more than once condemned by the Church, for they are opposed to the oneness of the Person of Christ even though the two natures are each complete and distinct.

106. Once this essential truth has been established we understand that the Heart of Jesus is the heart of a divine Person, the Word Incarnate, and by it is represented and, as it were, placed before our gaze all the love with which He has embraced and even now embraces us. Consequently, the honor to be paid to

the Sacred Heart is such as to raise it to the rank — so 104. Thus, from something corporeal such as the far as external practice is concerned — of the highest expression of Christian piety. For this is the religion of Jesus which is centered on the Mediator who is man and God, and in such a way that we cannot reach the Heart of God save through the Heart of Christ, as He Himself says: "I am the Way, the Truth and the Life. No one cometh to the Father save by Me."[107]

107. And so we can easily understand that the devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus, of its very nature, is a worship of the love with which God, through Jesus, loved us, and at the same time, an exercise of our own love by which we are related to God and to other men. Or to express it in another way, devotion of this kind is directed towards the love of God for us in order to adore it, give thanks for it, and live so as to imitate it; it has this in view, as the end to be attained, that we bring that love by which we are bound to God to the rest of men to perfect fulfillment by carrying out daily more eagerly the new commandment which the divine Master gave to His Apostles as a sacred legacy when He said: "A new commandment I give to you, that you love one another as I have loved you. . .This is My commandment that you love one another as I have loved you."[108] And this commandment is really new and Christ's own, for as Aguinas says, "It is, in brief, the difference between the New and the so far as to love intensely, through the Heart of the Old Testament, for as Jeremias says, 'I will make a new covenant with the house of Israel. [109] But that commandment which in the Old Testament was based on fear and reverential love was referring to the New Testament; hence, this commandment was in the old Law not really belonging to it, but as a preparation for the new Law."[110]

108. Before We conclude Our treatment of the concept of this type of devotion and its excellence in Christian life, which We have offered for your consideration — a subject at once attractive and full of consolation — by virtue of the Apostolic office which was first entrusted to Blessed Peter after he had made his threefold profession of love, We think it opportune to exhort you once again venerable brethren, and through you all those dear children of Ours in Christ, to continue to exercise an ever more vigorous zeal in promoting this most attractive form of piety; for from it in our times also We trust that very many benefits


