Confession times: 11:45 am & 5 pm Monday—Friday; 9 am & 4 pm Saturday. There will be **no confessions at 5 pm on Monday and Tuesday.**

Adoration/Benediction: is in the main church on Thursdays from 5 pm to 6 pm weekly.

Church open: During the day and evening hours. The church office is now open from 8am - 5pm and closed from 11:40am to 1pm daily.

Maidens of St. Joan's: meet 11 am to 2 pm Saturday June 6 in the parish hall. If you have any questions or would like to join, please contact Fr. Rapoport.

Adoration Chapel candles: We are offering the opportunity to donate the 13 beeswax candles used weekly in the Adoration chapel (six in each of the two 'candelabras' and one sanctuary candle), for specific intentions similar to lighting votive candles for specific intentions. A donation and intention for the candles (which burn for 8 days) will be accepted. The cost for using beeswax candles in the chapel is \$142 per eight days. Father Rapoport will be sponsoring the first week with his intention of '**Vocations from St. Joan of Arc parish'.** Please contact the church office if interested or with questions.

Social distancing: Although much progress has been made by the re-opening of the church, resumption of Holy Mass and confession, Benediction and (Perpetual) Adoration, we are still not back to 'normal'. <u>All-powerful</u>: "If I by the **Spirit** of God cast out devils, then is the kingdom of **God** come upon you." (Matthew 12:28)



Ember Days



THE EMBER DAYS

Tradtional days of fasting & penance

The term *Ember days* refers to a set of three days within the same week (Wednesday, Friday and Saturday) which are set apart for fasting, and Saturday after the following feasts: abstinence and prayer. Spaced evenly throughout the year at the beginning of each of the four seasons, these Ember days were known in Latin as the quatuor anni tempora – 'the four seasons of the year'; or also as *jejunia quatuor temporum* – 'the fasts of the four seasons.'

The purpose of their introduction was to thank God for the gifts of nature; to mark the start of a Fasting and penance used to be mandatatory on new season of the year; to teach men to make all Ember days, but this was lifted in 1966 by use of these gifts in moderation; and to remem- Pope Paul VI's decree Paenitemini. It is still a ber to assist the needy with any surplus. They praiseworthy custom to mark these Ember days also served as a reminder that man's time on on one's calendar, and to observe them with Earth is short and passing, as are the seasons.

For the average Catholic, living in a primarily agrarian world, sanctifying the different seasons of the year, upon which depended his sustinence, was an important part of life. In June were prayers for a bountiful harvest; in September for a rich vintage; in December and March for good seed.

There is a strong ecclesiastical connection with

such an agrarian model. From a good harvest of wheat in June come hosts for Holy Communion; a good vintage in the fall brings wine, to become Our Lord's Precious Blood; olives harvested in November produce holy oils for anointings; and from the activity of bees on the springtime flowers come wax, to make candles for light, even as Christ the light of the world. is

The seasonal Ember days originated at Rome, and from there spread to the rest of the Church. But as they came to be associated with great feasts, especially in connection with ecclesiastical ordinations, they eventually lost their connection to agriculture and came to be regarded solely as days of penitence and prayer.

On Ember Wednesdays and Saturdays, extra readings are added to the Mass. In addition to the Epistle and Gospel, one extra lesson is added on Wednesday; and on Saturdays, five. Some readings are from those books of the Bible which contain promises of a bountiful harvest to those that God. serve

The Ember days were definitively arranged and prescribed for the entire Church by Pope Gregory VII (1073-1085) as the Wednesday, Friday,

Pentecost Sunday:

The third Sunday of September (after the Exaltation of the Holy Cross)
