# A Precursor to the Sacraments in the Gospels

Answer: "We can learn quite a lot from this!

"In <u>Mark 3:15</u> we learn that near the beginning of Our Lord's public ministry He sent out His apostles in pairs to preach, and to miraculously heal from various afflictions: 'And he gave them power to heal sicknesses, and to cast out *devils.*' Later on we get the report of what happened when they did this, and at this later report we get the added detail of **how** it was that the Apostle healed the sicknesses: 'And they cast out many devils, and <u>anointed with oil</u> many that were sick, and healed them' (Mark 6:13).

"It was Our Lord's idea to send them out to miraculously heal the sick in the first place. Wouldn't it be unreasonable think that the apostles just invented this *way* of healing (anointing with oil) on their own? No, obviously the healing through the anointing with oil must have been part of Our Lord's original instruction in the first place; after all, it is Our Lord who is really doing the healing, so *He* should determine how this healing is going to be brought about. We only happened to find out about *the way* He wanted them to heal in a later chapter, but it was His original instruction.

**"The point is** that it seems clear that the *anointing with oil* detail was part of Our Lord's instructions for how the apostles were to heal. And that means that this sign of anointing with oil must have a significance. It was a foreshadow of the sacrament of extreme unction. Symbolically, oil signifies bringing *light*, nourish*ment* and *strength*.

"Our Lord could have simply said, 'Use my <u>Name</u> to heal the sick', or 'Ask them if they have *faith*', to bring about the healing. No, instead, knowing that we are body-and-soul creatures, Our Lord commanded that a sensible sign ac-

**Question**: "When Our Lord sent the apos- company the administration of this healing, seesibly what is going on spiritually teaches us about what spiritual healing is really doing in the soul.

> "**Something else we can learn**; this episode also shows us that we are not going to get every detail in only one verse of Sacred Scripture! The first verse mentioned nothing about using oil, and it is only in the later chapter that we learn that they did use *oil* to heal the sick. This should give us a caution, to avoid taking any one verse of Sacred Scripture out of the context of the whole of Scripture.

> "We also learn from this that Our Lord was going to use apostles as His agents for His healing. It is like when Sacred Scripture says that right after Our Lord's discussion with Nicodemus about the importance of being 'born again' of water and the Spirit, Jesus 'abode with [His disciples] and baptized' (John 3:23). However, we learn a few verses later that 'Jesus himself did not baptize, but his disciples' (John 4:2). In other words, although Sacred Scripture is saying that Jesus baptized, it is making it clear that He did so *through his disciples*. The apostles act in the place of Our Lord Jesus. This is why in the New Covenant, in the Catholic Church we have priests who are called to be the agents of Christ's healing and baptism.

> "There is so much we can know from studying Sacred Scripture! I hope that taking a look at these verses has given us a better sense of how Our Lord foreshadowed the tangible Sacraments of the New Covenant in the Gospels, and how He would act through the agency of His sacred ministers in that New Covenant.<sup>2</sup>

But, according to Gennadius, God grants the assistance of his grace only to those who pray for it. "We believe... that no one works out his salvation but by God's assistance; and that only he who prays merits aid from God." And Saint Augustine teaches that, except the first grace is a vocation to the faith and to repentance, all other graces, and particularly the grace of perseverance, are granted only to those who ask them. "It is evident that God gives some graces, that he who fortifies himself beforehand by prayer, such as the beginning of faith, without prayer – and prevents the entrance of sin into the soul. Hence theologians commonly teach, after Saint Basil, Saint John Chrysostom, Saint Augustine, Clement of Alexandria, and others, that, for adults, prayer is necessary as a means of salvation; that is, tain conditions are necessary: without prayer it is impossible for them to be saved. This doctrine may be inferred from the following passages of scripture: *"We ought always to pray"* (Luke 18:1). *"Ask, and you shall re*ceive" (John 16:24). "Pray without ceasing" (1 Thessalonians 5:17). The words we ought, ask, pray, according to Saint Thomas, and the generality of theo- *tion*. logians, imply a precept which obliges, under grievous sin, particularly in three cases: (1) When a man is in the state of sin; (2) When he is in danger of falling into sin; and (3) When he is in danger of death. Theologians teach, that he who at other times neglects prayer for a month, or at most for two months, cannot be excused from mortal sin; because without prayer we cannot procure the helps necessary for the observance of the law of God. Saint John Chrysostom teaches that as water is necessary to prevent trees from withering, so prayer is necessary to save us from perishing.

But why does God who knows our weakness, when he finds himself assailed by temptations, neglects to seek divine aid. Ask, says Jesus Christ, and you shall receive. Then, concludes Saint Teresa, he that does not ask does not receive. This is conformable to the doctrine of Saint James: "You have not, because you do not ask" (James 4:2).

Saint John Chrysostom says that prayer is a powerful weapon of defense against all enemies. "Truly prayer is a strong armor." St Ephraim writes saved from my enemies" (Psalm 17:4). [This is also the prayer the priest says while he receives Holy Communion.]

First, sin must be given up, for God does not hear obstinate sinners. Saint John Chrysostom says that he who prays while he cherishes a sinful affection does not pray but mocks God.

Secondly, it is necessary to pray with atten-

Thirdly, it is necessary to take away the occasions which hinder our prayer. He who is occupied in a thousand affairs unprofitable to the soul, so places a cloud that his prayer is prevented from passing to the throne of grace. "Thou hast set a cloud before thee, that our prayer may not pass through" (Lamentations 3:44). Let us not forget the exhortation of Saint Bernard to ask graces of God through the intercession of His Divine Mother.

Let us pray. Let us pray always. With prayer we shall obtain everything!
