Apologetics Corner

Defending our Faith with the Truth By Father Dennis M. Gordon, FSSP

Canon of Scripture

Question: "I want to use the <u>original</u> Bible – the one the earliest Christians used. How do we know which books of the Bible – say for example, the New Testament books – were the original books?"

authoritative source - which in this case is the teaching authority of the Catholic Church. In fact, the only reason you have the 27 books of the New Testament, that both Protestants and Catholics agree are indeed the only 27 inspired books that make up the New Testament, is because the Catholic Church told us that only these books make up the New Testament.

Council of Hippo (393 A.D.) and at the **Council** of Carthage (397 A.D.). At these councils, the Catholic Church declared that the books that make up the Bible are indeed the inspired books of the New Testament of Sacred Scripture. These 4th Century lists defined the 27 books that Protestants and Catholics today agree *are* the New Testament books, as well as the 46 books that Catholics say are in the Old Testament (the Protestant list omits seven of these)."

<u>Question</u>: "But wasn't the Church just declaring what all Christians held as the original Bible anyway? Weren't these books already in every Lord left to teach all nations; for as Our Lord said Bible?"

Answer: "That's actually not the case! The earliest manuscripts of the Bible in different places had *different* books included. Each place did not have every book. For example, here are the *earliest* manuscripts (called codices) that are in existence today:

"Codex Sinaiticus (4th Century) has Matthew through Revelation (all 27 books) but it ALSO has the Letter of Barnabas and the Shepherd of Hermas included! But these two additional books are **not** considered Sacred Scripture. Now Barnabas was an apostle, mentioned in the Acts of the Apostles, so wouldn't his writing be a good candidate for inclusion in Sacred Scripture? Why isn't this considered the original Bible?

"Codex Vaticanus (4th Century) has Matthew through 2 Thessalonians, Hebrews, James, and Jude but it *doesn't* have 1-2 Timothy, Titus, Philemon and Revelation. Why isn't this considered the original Bible?

"Codex Washingtonensis (4-5th Century) only Answer: "The only way to know that is from an contains Matthew, Mark, Luke and John. Why isn't this considered the original Bible?

"Codex Alexandrinus (5th Century) is even more interesting. It contains Matthew through Revelation (all 27 books, though a few chapters are missing). However, it also contains 1 and 2 Clem*ent* – two letters from someone who is mentioned in the Bible, and also happened to be the 4th Pope, included as though Sacred Scripture! Why isn't this considered the original Bible?

> "The answer to why aren't any of these manuscripts considered the 'original Bible' is that not every city had *every* Scriptural letter or book that was in circulation, bound into a codex. But on top of that we needed an *authoritative source*, not just an ancient collection or codex (especially since those collections varied in their content), to determine which books are indeed considered inspired Scripture. That authority is the Church that Our of the *apostles* when they act *together*, collegially, to *define* some teaching (as they did at the Councils of Hippo and Carthage), 'Whatsoever you shall bind on earth, shall be bound also in heav*en.*' (Matthew 18:18)

> "So if we want the 'original Bible' that was in existence, my answer would be: which one? which manuscript? which (incomplete) collection from which city do you want to accept as the 'original *Bible*? I think it is interesting (don't you?) that Protestants use and are trusting the *Catholic* Church's list of which books are the original ones of the New Testament, whether or not they are aware that this list *came from* the Catholic Church. No definitive list of which books comprised the Bible even existed until the Catholic Church declared it, so that list given by the Church *is* the original one!"
