

From Fr. Gordon: Since noise carries easily from the foyer (the narthex, or entryway) into the church, even with the glass doors closed, and since it has been hard for the priests in the adjacent confessionals to hear penitents at times, and since penitents in line for confession are trying to prepare for their confessions nearby, we kindly ask that people avoid talking out loud in the foyer. It is okay to whisper there, but the **main socializing area should be in the social hall**. Thank you for your consideration.

Also: Please do not bring baskets of food, etc. into the church. If you are attending a lunch afterward, picnic baskets should be left outside the nave of the church, in keeping with what Our Lord required of the Temple; "He suffered not that any man should carry a vessel through the temple" (Mark 11:16)

Apologetics Corner

Defending our Faith with the Truth By Father Dennis M. Gordon, FSSP

Passion Prediction

Question: "If the Lord Jesus was God, wouldn't He know the future? Did He predict His Passion and thew 26:2, where Our Lord said to His disciples, Death?"

Answer: "Yes, He did predict His Passion (a word which refers to His suffering, beginning with the Agony in the Garden and ending with His Death). In fact, St. Matthew's Gospel records five separate times that Our Lord predicted His own Passion, each

go. Not only did He predict His Passion and how He would die, but He also predicted when His Resurrection would take place, and what He would do after the Resurrection.

"The 1st Prediction of His Passion is in Matthew where 16:21, read, 'From that time Jesus began to show to His disciples that He must go to Jeru-

salem and suffer many things from the ancients and Lord, as God, of course knew the future and so He scribes and chief priests: and be put to death and was able to predict the details of His sufferings and the third day rise again.'

"The 2nd Prediction of His Passion is in Matthew 17:21-22, where we read, 'And when they abode together. In Galilee, Jesus said to them: The Son of Man shall be <u>betrayed</u> into the hands of men. And they shall kill Him: and the third day He shall rise again.' In this second prediction, Our Lord referring go to waste! We must cooperate with the infiveals a new prediction that He would be betrayed.

"The 3rd Prediction of His Passion is in Matthew 20:18-19, where Our Lord said to the twelve apostles, 'Behold we go up to Jerusalem, and the Son of Man shall be betrayed to the chief priests and the scribes: and they shall condemn Him to death. And shall deliver Him to the Gentiles to be mocked and scourged and crucified: and the third day He shall rise again.' In this third prediction, Our Lord reveals a new detail that He will be delivered to the sin and turning toward the Lord!" Gentiles, mocked and scourged, and while He had said before that He would be put to death, now He reveals that He would die by crucifixion.

"The 4th Prediction of His Passion is in Mat-You know that after two days shall be the Pasch: and the Son of Man shall be delivered up to be crucified.' This prediction hints at a new detail that the Crucifixion would take place around the upcoming Pasch, in two days.

"The 5th Prediction of His Passion is in Matone revealing more details of what He was to under- thew 26:31-32, where He said, 'All you shall be


scandalized in me <u>this</u> night. For it is written: I will strike the shepherd: and the sheep of the flock shall be dispersed. But after I shall be risen again, I will go before you into Galilee.' Here Our Lord predicts that the Passion would begin that very night, the night of the Last Supper, and that after His Resurrection He would see them in Galilee.

"Each one of these predictions came true! Our

death, and what would happen afterward. All four Gospels recount that Our Lord predicted His future sufferings in detail. Our Lord knew what He would endure, and He came into this world to endure it: to redeem us from sin.

"Let us not let the infinite value of Our Lord's sufnite merits of Our Lord's Passion and Death, by conversion of life; by turning away from sin. If we do not turn away from sin (that is, repent), the Precious Blood of Jesus cannot be applied to us. 'Except brandish converted. He will sword' (**Psalm 7:13**). We have to be willing to be converted: 'If thou wilt be converted, I will convert thee' (**Jeremiah 15:19**).

"Let us spend this Lent, then, turning away from

St. Antoninus relates that an Angel proposed to a sick man the choice of being confined to Purgatory for three days, or of being condemned to a continuation of his infirmities for two years. The sick man chose the three days in Purgatory; but scarcely had an hour elapsed in that place of torments, then he began to complain of the Angel for having condemned him to a purgation not of three days but of several years. "Your body is still warm on the bed of death, and you speak of having spent years in Purgatory," said the Angel. If you wish to suffer in peace, imagine that you have still to live 15 or 20 years, and say: This is my purgatory, it is the spirit rather than the body that I must conquer.
