Apologetics Corner

Defending our Faith with the Truth By Father Dennis M. Gordon, FSSP

Sedevacantism

Question: "I heard that St. Robert Bellarmine taught that when a Pope becomes a heretic, he ceases Pope when becoming a manifest heretic, he still must to be Pope. So if I have concluded that he has taught be deposed by a Council for the effects to be clear for something heretical, does this mean he isn't the the Church. Answer: "This is a complicated question which theologians have debated over the years, but no certain teaching exists in the Church on this. Since St. Robert Bellarmine is so often quoted on this, let's look at what he said.

Robert gives five 1. It will never happen that the Pope becomes a mani- longer a Pope, which is why it is absolutely consistent heretic (which fest he agreed 2. That at the moment the Pope falls into heresy, even if it is interior and unknown to men (i.e., an occult heretic), he would become a heretic (which he refutes):

3. That the Pope cannot be deposed or judged if he becomes heretic (which a he refutes); 4. That the Pope ceases to actually be Pope only when a Council convicts him of heresy (which he refutes); 5. That the Pope, if he were a manifest heretic, would cease to be Pope at that moment (which he holds to be the true opinion).

"So, isn't that open and shut? Not precisely, because one needs to read **all** of St. Robert's works to understand the case, especially his ecclesiology. Firstly, he is treating the question *ex parte Papae* (on the side of the Pope), and as Pope he would cease. This is important because according to the fourth opinion, he would remain a true Pope while being a heretic, which means a Council stepping in would be judging a true Pope, which is Conciliarism. Yet, when St. Robert examines this question ex parte Ecclesiae (on the side of the Church), he says that a *Council is* still required. Speaking on the need for Councils, he says, "The fourth reason is suspicion of heresy in the Roman Pontiff, if perhaps it might happen... for then a general Council ought to be gathered to depose the Pope if he should be found to be a heretic." (Councils, book 1 c. 9).

"This means that while a Pope would cease to be is clear enough from the same book (c. 21) where, refuting the conditions that the Lutherans placed on calling a Council, says that the Pope "cannot be deprived of his right to summon Councils and preside over them ... unless he were *first* convicted by the legitimate judgment of a Council, and is not the Supreme Pontiff." > "Moreover, St. Robert speaks of 'manifest heresy'. This involves an understanding of the theological notes. Firstly, the heresy must be manifest, that means in public, something he said himself either in writing or verbally in a speech. Secondly, it has to be haeretica, i.e. against a de fide teaching of the Church, e.g. that Christ is God, Mary is the Mother of God, etc., not a lower teaching, say, among theologians, or saying something that sounds scandalous, or that another attributes to the Pope. It can't be something in itself erroneous or scandalous, though not against a de fide teaching. And as we've seen, he would have to be formally deposed by a Council.

> "Just as importantly, while St. Robert Bellarmine was a great theologian, and is a Doctor of the Church, nevertheless, there is no consensus among theologians about what would happen if a Pope did become a heretic. As Cardinal Franzelin, a peritus at Vatican I notes, when there is no consensus of the classical theologians, or when it is the judgment of one teacher, "Nothing certain can be derived from it" (On Divine Tradition, thesis 16). This means that one cannot withdraw himself from communion with the Church because he supposes the Pope has taught something *heretical*, or that anyone knows what absolutely *must* happen. Rather, we must wait for the Church to adduce it into practice."

feared certain Cardinals that he believed to be heretics, particularly Cardinal Marone (who was actually a faithful Cardinal) might become Pope, and he wanted to lay the foundation for annulling their papacy. now and in perpetuity? And for that matter, what changed the language of texts, rubrics, etc., would fall about Quo Primum, which also says it is valid now under his censure. And again, the accompanying Bull and in perpetuity? Wouldn't that mean that any Pope Quod a Nobis (1568) on the Breviary says precisely who tries to change the Mass is automatically excommunicated, and not a real Pope?"

"Both documents are legal documents, and the phrase in perpetuum valitura (valid in perpetuity) is basically legalese, reflecting the classical notion of law, namely that a law should be efficient and in effect until a better or more perfect law would replace it, given by one with the same authority. Every Pope has the same authority as Paul IV and St. Pius V, and has the full authority to change or even abrogate documents put in place by their successors. Cum Ex Apostolatus Officio was promulgated by Paul IV with the full agreement of the Cardinals, directed to the whole Church. Yet, at the same time, it lays out *legal penalties*; it is not a doctrine of faith and morals. Likewise, Quo Primum of St. Pius V does not teach a doctrine of faith and morals, rather it directs what version of the be formally deposed by a Council, and one cannot Missal is going to be said. For example, Pope Gregory IX, in Rex Excelsus (1234) forbade alienations of patrimonials of the Apostolic See

"Cum Ex Apostolatus Officio was a juridical docu- without the prior consensus of the Cardinals in perpement of Pope Paul IV which he authored because he tuum valitura constitutione sancimus etc; Innocent VIII in Non debet reprehensibile (1487) sets the number of papal secretaries at 24, and declared it to be in perpetuum valitura; St. Pius V, in his Motu Proprio Cum Vices Ejus (1572) forbid anyone to carry any dagger measuring less than 18 inches in length, and declares: in perpetuum valitura constitutione sancimus! that it will "always and perpetually be valid, firm and efficacious." Yet we see how "forever" turned out when Pope Pius VII abrogated it and restored the Jesuits."

"Firstly, if St. Pius V's Quo Primum was infallible, since it declares that no one may change the slightest "But isn't Cum Ex infallible since it says it is valid thing, then every subsequent Pope who added feasts, the same thing, with the same threat of the wrath of Ss. Peter and Paul, yet Popes changed the Breviary, even very significantly, e.g. Pius X. Gregory XIII added the feast of Our Lady of Victory, and subsequent Popes added feasts, changed the text of the vulgate used in the Missal, rubrics, etc., yet no one in the tradition ever supposed they incurred the wrath of Ss. Peter and Paul; rather, that they had the same authority as St. Pius V himself. The fact is that decreeing how the Mass is to be said is not an "article of faith." The fact we have articles of faith *about* the Mass, does not make decreeing the use of a certain Missal de *Fide*. Theologians universally hold the foundation of religious orders to be infallible, yet their constitutions, or suppression of the same is not an article of faith.
