

Praying to the Saints

Question: "I want to ask about sending others more pleasing to God to go to Him directly?"

Answer: "Your question is about what is *more* pleasing to God when asking things of Him. And your question implies that God would not be ing those who he thought were more worthy to in-

There is an answer so let's see what the Bible has to say about it!

"Do you remember that **Bible** savs that "without it is faith impossible please

God" (Hebrews 11:6)? Even in our petitions to God, it is our *faith* in Him that is pleasing to draws us closer to Him, whether or not we get what we might want ("we have boldness and access with confidence by the faith of Him'' - Ephesians 3:12). With that in mind, let's see what Our Lord thought of an incident when someone specifically did not go directly to Our Lord to ask Him for something, sending someone *else* instead, who he thought was more "worthy" to go to Our Lord to intercede. In the word, and my servant shall be healed" (Luke sus." (1 Timothy 2:1-5)" 7:7).

Motivation

tell ourselves that we want this virtue or to get rid of that tion. fault: we think we mean it, but often we do not actually will it. Subconsciously we might say to ourselves, "It's a lot of trouble to get this virtue, or overcome this vice, isn't it? Do I really want it enough to make all that continued effort? I will try for a while, but if it gets too difficult, I will drop it." One can often conclude that because he admires a virtue speculatively, he therefore has a sincere desire for it. What can follow is the mistake that because we know about the virtue, we admire the virtue, and we would *like* to have it, therefore we do have it, or at least we believe we have a true desire for it. However, speculative admiration or desire for virtue will not produce the virtue, nor does it move the will to adopt the means to acquire it by personal effort. We need to decide to do something about it that will actually get us the virtue.

It is only when I conceive a good as actually good for **me** that my will is moved to do something about getting that good. What moves my will to action is not a speculative judgment, but a *practical* judgment about the goodness of a thing for me. A mother who is trying to convince a child to take a medicine that the child doesn't like is in the position of trying to convince the child that this medicine is a good thing for him or her, but the child isn't all that convinced. Unless I convince myself by a practical judgment that the challenge of finding and conquering my predominant fault or the effort involved in acquiring a particular virtue is really a good that I need to have for myself, is the only course for me, I will never tackle the job.

There is a big difference between speculative and practical desires.

The difference between speculative and practical desires, is that practical desire determines to find ways and means to get the thing desired. If our attraction for virtue or our determination to overcome vice becomes strong enough, the intellect will send down a message to the will (which, being a blind faculty, is unable to comprehend the goodness of a thing, except as presented to the will by the intellect). Our intellect has to come to this point, to say: "I've added up and weighed everything and have concluded that it is good for me to have this virtue or overcome this vice." Once the will has determined that it will achieve this, it will start looking about for the means by which it can execute this determination.

The will can operate only on information fed to it by the intellect. The *intellect* is the "knowing" faculty, which is to present to the will motives or reasons in the form of good for doing or not doing what it does. The will is like an engineer hidden deep in the bowels of a ship: he isn't seen, nor can he see where the ship is going. His job is to provide movement to the ship. The intellect, on the other hand, is like the captain on the ship's bridge. He directs where the ship goes. Similarly, the intellect sends messages to the blind will, telling it that it is good to do or not to do, this or that, to seek or not to seek this or that. This

Every one of us has the ability to deceive ourselves more process of the intellect furnishing data to the will about completely than another could possibly deceive us. We the desirability of acting or not acting is called motiva-

> In the case of sin, the intellect sends down a false message telling the will that something bad is good and the will should move toward it. In practicing virtue or overcoming faults, much will depend on motivation, that is, upon the message that the intellect sends to the will. Lack of motivation, then, must be blamed first for scant progress in the spiritual life. Progress can be negligible because we have not properly motivated our self. The intellect has to make the possession of that virtue, or being rid of that vice, appear as a sufficiently practical, personal good for **us** to do what it takes to achieve that spiritual goal. Sufficient motivation is the first step we must take on the road to improvement. We have to motivate ourselves to say: "I want this, and with the help of God's grace, and nothing will keep me from it."

How do we achieve sufficient motivation?

Motivation and determination must ultimately come from within the individual. Until it comes from within, until motivation and determination are present within, little progress will be made. We can pray to God to move the will directly, but that's not enough. Before the intellect can present cogent motives to the will, it must itself be convinced of the goodness and desirability of the object in question. The intellect, then, must perform it's threefold operation of apprehension, judgment, and reason**ing** on the truth about the particular virtue, or the vice. The intellect must **apprehend** that the virtue is important enough to be obtained or the vice to be conquered. It must make a correct judgment about the proper way to obtain the virtue or overcome the vice. The intellect must **reason** that the very means that will obtain the virtue or conquer the vice are the ones that it will actually take up.

To put it more plainly, we must **meditate**. To get our intellect to the point where it will have the right apprehension, judgment and reasoning that will motivate us in the spiritual life, we have to meditate. Saint Alphonsus said, "All the Saints became Saints because of mental prayer [meditation]." We should meditate on the various motives which will impel us to embrace the virtue or attack the vice. We should meditate to obtain greater faith, proper reasoning, and true love of God, and this true love of God is the best motivation for us in the spiritual life. We should meditate upon how much God loves us and how much he has done for us, and this should inspire a response of love in return. Insufficient meditation is the reason why so many people stay in sin or don't advance in the spiritual life.

God wants us to be happy, and he wants us to overcome vice, and obtain virtue. We will get to know how much he wants this, and how to obtain these things, by spending time with him in Catholic meditation.
