Apologetics Corner

Defending our Faith with the Truth By Father Dennis M. Gordon, FSSP

"This Generation..."

Question: "In Our Lord's words speaking about the destruction of Jerusalem and the end of the sions (the stars falling, the sun darkened and the age, Our Lord said, "This generation shall not pass moon not giving her light) Our Lord is borrowing lanaway till all things be fulfilled." Answer: "People who read Matthew 24:34, this generation shall not pass away, and they believe that there is a problem. It seems to some who read this that Our Lord predicted something that didn't together as a book: and all their host shall fall down come to pass.

"I have heard people who are not so familiar with Sacred Scripture and the Jewish expressions that Our Lord is using blasphemously suggest that Our Lord must have here prophesied something that did not come true. "His words were indeed predicting something that *did* happen in one generation, which was the destruction of the Temple which (as Our Lord predicted) was indeed destroyed within 40 years, one generation.

"However, as I said, the Greek term 🗆 γενεά (he genea – the generation) means generation, time or **age**. In other words, Our Lord in saying Ω γενεά (he genea) was also saying "this age shall not pass away till all things be fulfilled." And indeed we are in almost verbatim to speak of the coming destruction of the final age of the world, where all is being fulfilled. "What about the idea of the stars falling, the sun darkened and the moon not giving her light? Surely that has to be a reference to the end of the world, right?"

"Actually, not necessarily. By these expresguage was a way that the Jewish prophets would predict that a kingdom's 'time is up'. See what I mean in these examples:

"Isaiah 34:4 The "heavens shall be folded as the leaf falleth from the vine, and from the fig *tree.*" This reference to the stars falling (the host of heaving falling down) actually refers to the fall of Egyptian kingdom, time was up for the Egyptian kingdom as we knew it.

"Isaiah 13:6-19 "Howl ye, for the day of the famous pride of the Chaldeans, shall be even as the Lord destroyed Sodom and Gomorrha."

"Can you see that this language about *the stars* of heaven, and their brightness shall not display their light: the sun shall be darkened in his rising, and the moon shall not shine with her light is talking about the end of the Babylonian kingdom's time as a nation? This language wasn't referring to the end of the world.

"It is this very language that Our Lord borrows within yevea "this generation", in 70 A.D., and the end of the *world* which will happen within yeveà 'this age'!"

Alexander the Great knew well how to conquer numerous kingdoms; But in a few years he died an all was lost to him. Henry the eighth knew how to maintain his throne by rebelling against the church; But in the end he himself, seeing that his soul was lossed, confessed: "we have lost all!" how many wretches now weep and cry out in hell : "What has pride profited us, or what advantage has the boasting of riches brought us?

sions! And shall we not consider him such, as who, for а momentary gratification imperils his soul and incurs the risk of losing it forever? The ruin of SO many souls who are now lost was there carrying only for present



goods and ills, and not thinking upon those that *he* are eternal.

God most certainly has not placed us in this world to become rich, to acquire honors, or to gratify our senses, but to gain eternal life: "and the end life everlasting" (Romans 6:22); and to attain this end is all we ought to care for : "one thing is necessary" (Luke 10:42). But this end is just what sinners most despise; they think only of the present; They hastened forward to death; They approached the entrance to eternity, and they know not where they go! What would you think of a pilot, says Saint Augustine, who, when asked where he was going, should answer that he did not know? Is he not bringing his ship

All those things have passed away like a shadow" (Wisdom 5:8). Behold. for us all the goods of the world have passed as а shadow, and nothing membranes of them but tears and eternal suffering.

"Before man is life and death; ... that which be

shall choose shall given *him*" (Ecclesiasticus 15: 18). My brother, life and death are placed before you in this world : that is, to deprive yourself of forbidden pleasures, and gaining eternal life; Or to accept them, and with them eternal death. What do you say? Which do you prefer? Choose as a man, and not as a beast. Choose as a Christian who has faith, and says : "What does it profit a man if he gains the whole world and suffered the loss of his own soul?" (Matthew 16: 26)
