# Adoration

**Question**: "Why do Eucharistic Adoration?"

Answer: "Well, if someone told you, 'Guess what! Our Blessed Lord is appearing at this moment right here in Post Falls!' wouldn't you come to where He was to see Him?

"St. Augustine says that not only do we *not* sin by going to adore Our Lord in His Eucharistic Presence in the Most Blessed Sacrament, but we do sin by not adoring Him there.

"Our Lord identified Himself with the Temple Adoration makes up for the irreverence of many itself in **John 2:19-20**, and since to the Jews the Temple was nothing other than the place of

found act of faith, and each act of faith that draws us deep than we have been drawn before causes an increase in our faith.

"Our Lord, and the Old Testament priest Melchisedech who was a type (a foreshadow) of Our Lord, 'was heard for his reverence' (Hebrews **5:**7). So we also, if we want to be heard by God, we also need to be reverent. This is what Eucharistic Adoration does: it gives God some of the reverence due to Him. Our reverent presence at others.

"Doesn't Our Lord deserve the consolation of

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God's dwelling on earth. by identifying Himself with the Temple He is saying that, 'From now on, place the God's of dwelling on earth found is



where My Body is found.' But Our Lord's Sacred Body is actually what the Blessed Sacrament really and truly is, so the Blessed Sacrament is indeed how God dwells on this earth since the institution of the New Covenant.

"Our Lord is just as present in the Blessed Sacrament, the Sacred Host, as He is in heaven. So why not go to spend time with Him where He is, then?

"It takes faith to see God present there when the appearances just look like bread. Eucharistic Adoration then also will increase our faith, for when we treat the Blessed Sacrament exactly as though He were appearing in His presence as He was in the Holy Land, or as He appeared transfigured in glory on Mount Tabor, we make a pro-

Earth to be with us in justice require a response of our presence with Him where He has humbled Himself to make Himself physically present among us?

"So come to the dwelling place of God on earth: come to His dwelling in Post Falls, Idaho – in the Most Blessed Sacrament of the altar, in Eucharistic Adoration!

"You will become holy. You will receive inner joy. You will recover the peace you need to continue on in life. And you will give Him consolation."

# **Spiritual Reading for Lent**

Great means of sanctification come from spiritual reading, especially reading Sacred Scripture, the masters of the interior life (St. John of the Cross, St. Teresa of Avila, St. Thomas Aquinas, St. Alphonsus Liguori, St. Alphonsus Rodriguez, Tauler, etc.), and the lives of the Saints. Some works are theological (teaching doctrine), some are **spiritual** (describing the interior life), and others are devotional (motivation to grow in the spiritual life). The Gospels take priority, as they contain for us special graces that incline us more to the imitate the virtues of Christ. After this comes the Acts of the Apostles (the "Lives of the Original Saints"), and the Epistles.
