Answer: "To understand St. Paul's thought on this issue we first have to understand his terms discussion on this topic.

"Justification is the moment that a man is moved from a state of sin to a state of friendship (state of grace) with God. This first happened for us at Baptism. If we have been justified (placed into a state of grace) then we are saved unless we lose that state by a new, mortal sin.

'Faith (pisiV - pistis) is a supernatural virtue by which one believes all that God has revealed. Like in English, it also has the connotation of fidelity, as when one keeps faith with someone, so faith is ongoing – it can't be just one act in the past, and faith can be lost.

Notice he *didn't* say faith alone. Also notice that he said one is justified by faith, **apart** from the works of the law, but we know this means keeping faith in Christ, 'separate from the works of the torah'. In context, St. Paul's point was that we don't need circumcision in addition to our faith.

"What does the New Testament say about works - good deeds? In James 2:14-24 we read these words: "What shall it profit, my brethren, if a man say he hath faith, but hath not works? Shall faith be able to save him?... So faith also, if it have not works, is dead in itself. ... Was not Abraham our father justified by works, offering up Isaac 'Works of the Law (in Greek, ergwn nomou his son upon the altar?
