'Personal Lord and Savior'

Answer: "I agreed that I would accept Him when I became a Catholic, but whether one has accepted Him is a question that is only answered by how one chooses to live one's daily life, with each new day and each new decision.

"In Evangelical Christian circles that question (Have you accepted Christ...) has a particular meaning, and that meaning is really: 'have you been

However, in answer to that, with St. Paul, as a Catholic I must answer:

"I do not count myself to have apprehended. But one thing I do: forgetting the things that are behind, and stretching forth myself to those that are before, I press towards the mark, to the prize of the supernal vocation of God in Christ Jesus... not as though I have already attained, or were already perfect; but I follow after, if I may by any means apprehend." (Philippians 3:13, 12) St. Paul is definitely talking about salvation here (the prize of the supernal vocation), and he sees himself "not as though [he has] already attained" it.

"When Catholics get this question, there is a temptation to blurt out, 'yes, of course...'; after all, which Catholic, aware that Christ is the Lord and is our Savior doesn't want to say that he has 'accepted' Him? > "Although the criterion of "accepting Christ as your personal Lord and Savior" is not found in the Bible, Evangelical Christians take their idea of it from Romans 10:9, where St. Paul says, "For if thou confess with thy mouth the Lord Jesus, and believe in thy heart that God hath raised him up from the dead, thou shalt be saved." Notice a key phrase: believe in thy heart. What does that mean? Today we tend

> > to think of the heart as just the seat of the emotions, but to the ancients (including St. Paul) the heart is the seat of the will. In other words, to believe with the heart means to will, to choose, like you believe.

> > "Some biblical examples of this: "The fool will speak foolish things, and **his heart** will work iniquity." (Isaiah 32:6). "For in your **heart** you work iniquity...." (**Psalms 57[58]:3**)

> > "Now consider how St. Paul views faith—as a faith that must be in action: "For in Christ Jesus neither circumcision availeth any

thing, nor uncircumcision: but faith that worketh by charity." (Galatians 5:6) And what is the charity of God that St. Paul says avails? "This is the charity of God, that we keep His commandments" (1 **John 5:3**)
