Apologetics Corner

Defending our Faith with the Truth By Father Dennis M. Gordon, FSSP


Answer: Good question! The real question, though, is; does it matter to **God** what we do for our Sunday worship? Let's look in the *Bible* to find out!

"How seriously does God take how He is worshipped-how important to Him is the way in which He is worshipped? know that answer from the Bible-we know from Leviticus 10:1-2 what God thinks of the idea of a minister deciding himself what to do for the public worship of God. In this passage, the sons of Aaron

(Nadab and Abiu) who were already priests, designated so by the command of God Himself, offered incense "which was not commanded them. And fire coming out from the Lord destroyed them." In other words, these priests (whom we know were chosen by God!) were given the death penalty for offering worship in a way that God did not command. That is how seriously the Bible says that God takes the public worship offered to Him!

"But not only how God was to be worshipped was chosen by Him, but also who could lead that worship. Numbers 1:50-51 and Numbers 3:10 tell us that if anyone other than a designated priest even entered the Old Covenant sanctuary (the place where worship was offered), he was to be put to death! This is serious business, according to the Bible!

Lord said, "do this in commemoration of Me." What does 'this' refer to? It refers to what Our Lord just did-change the bread into His Body and the wine into His Blood. And this is what our Catholic priests do in the 'Mass.'



"In the early Christian church, not every believer could anoint and specially bless the sick– only the *priests* could (James 5:14). But if not every believer could specially bless the sick, doesn't it make sense that not every believer could specially bless bread and wine to change it into the Body and Blood of

Our Lord?! In fact, in the Bible, offering sacrifice using bread and wine was done by a priest only (see Genesis 14:8 and Numbers 18:8). And how one is made a priest in the New Covenant is shown by 1 **Timothy 4:14**—"with imposition of the hands". And this imposition of hands to "ordain priests" must be done by "a bishop" (Titus 1:5-7).

"So according to the Bible, it does matter to God what we do for our public worship; not every believer could lead that worship, and Our Lord did give believers something specific that He wanted done for His public worship. That specific act of worship is this: offering His Body, Blood, Soul and Divinity under the appearance of bread and wine—an offering made by the hands of designated priests; priests who were made so by the personal *imposition of hands* of a bishop."
