**Idaho Catholic Appeal**—we reached our goal for the Idaho Catholic Appeal! In the span of 3 weeks, we raised \$120,000! Our goal was ~\$110,000 and we raised \$130,000! The diocese was very surprised and of course happy that we reached our goal. The extra \$20,000 will be refunded back to us and will not be taxed.

#### Marian Devotions Recommended by St. Alphonsus Liguori

- 1. Recite at least five decades of the Rosary every day
- 2. Fast in honor of the Blessed Virgin (every Saturday and on vigils of her principal feasts).

#### **Certitude Part II**

And we saw, further, that the mind's firm conviction is based upon objective evidence: a particular state of affairs is precisely as the mind is firmly convinced it is. Aloysius is firmly convinced that St. Paul is the capital of Minnesota, and in that Aloysius possesses genuine certitude. He The basis for physical certitude is the stable regularity is not deceived.

The next question we have to ask about certitude is this: Are there degrees of certitude? The answer to that question is Yes and No. It depends on what we are focusing our attention upon when we ask the question: the subjective state, or the objective evidence which causes the subjective state. Let's take the "No" answer first.

If we focus our attention upon the subjective state alone, the frame of mind of the person who is experiencing certitude about something, then there are no degrees of certitude. It is simply a case of either/or. Either a person is certain about something or he isn't. There is no middle ground. There is no such thing as partial certitude. To be "almost certain" is not to be certain, for you are still entertaining doubts about the matter. So, once again, when it comes to the state of mind characterized by a firm conviction about something, there are no degrees of certitude. The firm conviction is either present, in which case a person has certitude, or it is not, in which case the person is in doubt.

But now let us switch our focus to the objective state of affairs, to the evidential foundation which is the cause of the subjective certitude. Here we are talking about what we identified as objective certitude. Now, in this realm of objective certitude we can properly speak about degrees of certitude. These degrees of certitude are based upon the kind of evidence we have to deal with and its relative strength. In Scholastic philosophy we have traditionally acknowledged three degrees of certitude: metaphysical certitude; physical certitude; moral certitude.

> of those laws of nature. With metaphysical certitude, as we saw, it is impossible for me to conceive that the object of my certitude should be different from what it is. This is not the case with physical certitude. Here it is possible for me to conceive that the object of my certitude could be different from what it is. However, the likelihood of it ever being so is very remote.

> For example, if I step off ledge of the pool on which I am now standing, I have physical certitude that I will promptly sink into the depths of the water with which the pool is filled. The laws of nature dictate that it shall be so. Now, it is conceivable that in certain cases the laws of nature might be suspended by divine intervention. And this is precisely what happens when miracles occur. Christ walked on water. But under normal circumstances I can have physical certitude that the laws of nature will operate as they were designed to operate.

Moral certitude is the kind of certitude I have concerning the generally predictable patterns of human behavior. The basis for moral certitude, therefore, is the overall stability of that behavior. For example, if I am dealing with a person whom I know to be virtuous, then I can have moral certitude that whatever that person tells me is true. Why? Because there are predictable patterns to human behavior, and virtuous people can be relied upon not to tell lies. We can readily see that moral certitude is not as firmly based as is physical certitude or metaphysical certitude, for in this case we are dealing with the fluid factor of free will. Even the virtuous sometimes act unvirtuously. Nonetheless, moral certitude is real certitude. We can indeed conceive of things being otherwise than we take them to be when we have moral certitude, but Metaphysical certitude is the kind of certitude I have our confidence in our convictions is warranted because it is based upon objective realities.
