Certitude Part I

the point of view of Scholastic philosophy.

One of the abiding scandals of philosophy is that almost from its very beginnings there have been those who have called themselves philosophers and yet who have chosen to wage war upon certitude. These are the sceptics. Scepticism is that point of view which maintains, with varying qualifications, that the human mind is incapable of attaining truth. In other words, sceptics are convinced that we are not really capable of certitude.

Now, scepticism is a self-contradictory position, but that is something which never seems very much to bother the sceptics themselves. The explanation is clear. Those seriously committed to irrationality, as are the sceptics, are just for that reason immune to any rational criticism of their position. The naked emperor parading proudly about the streets regards as blind fools those who fail to appreciate his gorgeous garments. Scepticism is the evidence which philosophy offers as proof for the reality of original sin and the sorry consequences it has for the human intellect.

Is certitude possible? The extreme sceptic replies to that question with an emphatic No. The soft sceptic replies by saying that he is not certain, which is a good as saying No. To be uncertain about the very possibility of certitude is to undermine the search for truth right at the outset. Our response to the question is of course a resounding Yes! Certitude is possible, then. But what is certitude?

We can begin our explanation of the nature of certitude by describing it as a state of mind. More precisely, we define it as a state of mind characterized by a firm conviction that something is true. Note that the definition has two elements to it, a subjecobjective truth is the warrant and justification for certitude with all reasonable speed. + subjective convictions.

I can only be said to be genuinely certain of something if what I am convinced is true is in fact true. > As our experiences constantly demonstrate to us, a "certitude" which is not based upon (caused by) what is actually true is quite worthless. If I am "certain" that my flight to Peoria leaves at 11 AM when in fact it leaves a at 9 am, my firm conviction about the matter is not going to do me much good. Perhaps the only thing certain about the situation is that I'm going to miss my flight. I can be said to be certain in the strict sense (i.e., to have genuine certitude) if, for example, I am firmly convinced that Andrew Johnson was the 17th president of the United States, because, in fact, Andrew Johnson was the 17th president of the United States.

> The opposite of certitude is doubt. Doubt is that state of mind characterized by a lack of any firm conviction as to whether or not something is true. The state of doubt is aptly described when we talk about being "of two minds" about something. It could be true; on the other hand, it could be false. We're just not sure. We are not convinced one way or another.

> Needless to say, the state of doubt is not a very comfortable one to be in, nor a very healthy one to remain in for any length of time. If we are in a state of doubt over important issues, it is imperative that we successfully exit that state as soon as possible.


