Mass intentions are open: Please make checks out to St. Joan of Arc and submit your Mass intentions to the office, the black box at the back of church, or by mail. Once a Mass has been said by the St. Joan of Arc priests, the intention will be posted on the letterboard on a weekly basis.

Marian Devotions Recommended by St. Alphonsus Liguori

- 1. Recite at least five decades of the Rosary every day
- 2. Fast in honor of the Blessed Virgin (every Saturday and on vigils of her principal feasts).
- 3. Recite Angelus three times a day; salute her frequently during the day with an Ave Maria, particularly when you hear the clock strike, or when you see an image of the Virgin, and also when you leave or return to your house.
- 4. Say the Litany of the Blessed Virgin every evening before you go to bed; keep an image of Mary near your bed.
- 5. Wear the scapular (Black or Brown)
- 6. Recommend yourself frequently to her prayers. Never forget to say three Hail Marys in the morning, to beg of her to preserve you from sin during the day.

What does it mean to say that we accept something perable problem. It means that we are accepting can we take God's word unless we first believe that something as true on foundation upon which account He exists? And it would seem not a little puzzling to of authority. Authority is the foundation upon which believe that God exists on the basis of the word of a faith rests.

What is authority? Authority is simply a source of knowledge which we take to be reliable. Authority is the medium through which are made known to us a countless number of truths to which we confidently adhere. Now, the point to be stressed about authority is this: it serves as evidence. In other words, it represents a legitimate basis for certitude.

There are two basic types of faith, natural faith and supernatural faith, and, accordingly, there are respectively two types of authority behind them, human authority and divine authority. Most of the truths that we hold as certain are founded upon human authority. Now, human authority is notoriously variable. Sometimes it is worthy of the trust we put in it, sometimes it is not. Divine authority, on the other hand, is infallibly reliable.

Authority, as we said, serves as a genuine basis for certitude, but if it is human authority which is in essary Being. Our first duty as rational agents, in the matter of founding certitude upon faith, is to test the reliability of the authority whose word we will be accepting. We can have genuine certitude through faith only to the extent to which the authority upon which the faith is based is legitimate. In our daily lives we know well enough how this principle operates. We acknowledge as legitimate authorities only those people who, as

There are two extremes to avoid in responding to and assessing authority: incredulousness and credulousness. The incredulous type (of which you will find many in the world in which we live) is irrationally suspicious of *all* authority, and thus deprives him-

When we consider the question of supernatural faith, we might be distracted by what seems to be an insu-God of whose existence we are doubtful. Are we just going around in circles here? No, we are not, for we can know that God exists, and that He is the source of al truth, through the exercise of our reason. That is to say, we can come to the knowledge that God exists through science, specifically through the science of natural theology. Once we come to know that God exists, and know something of His eminently trustworthy nature, then we know the Authority with whom we are dealing.

Unquestionably, the most important certitude we can have is that which concerns matters of supernatural faith. Because God is the authority on the basis of which we accept the truths of our faith, we are justified in holding those truths with the firmest kind of conviction. We can have metaphysical certitude regarding them. Metaphysical certitude, we will remember, pertains to the very essence of things, to the way things necessarily are. Now, God is Himself Nec-
