## Mercy

mercy-not so much from others as from God-is that we ourselves are merciful. But what does that entail? What does it mean to be merciful, or to have mercy? As always, it is very helpful to "go to Thomas" and hear what the Common Doctor has to say about the matter. He provides us with an important first step toward arriving at a sound understanding of the nature of mercy when he tells us that it is "the compassionate regard for the misery of others." The merciful person is not one who regards the misery of others in an impersonal, unfeeling manner. His is a compassionate regard. Our English "compassion" has its roots in a Latin word which connotes a "feeling with." S.t Thomas brings out this aspect of mercy in telling fashion when he writes that the merciful person "sees the misery of others as if it were his own". We have here, then, a rather intimate bond which is established between the one who shows mercy and the one to whom the mercy is shown.

But we would fall considerably short of understanding the nature of mercy were we to think it is merely a matter of who are suffering. I might say to someone, "I feel your pain," and in saying it may in fact be deeply moved by the sad plight of another human being, but if my feelings never take on concrete, external expression, if they do not bear fruit in ameliorating action, mercy has then not been fully realized and remains but a truncated version of the genuine virtue. Mercy is fulfilled, is made complete, when we take action to alleviate, insofar as we can, the suffering of others. In some instances perhaps the only action we are able to take-by no means to be disparaged-is the action of prayer. This is "doing something" about suffering in an especially efficacious way. But if, along with prayer, we are in a position to alleviate suffering in a direct, material way, we have at our disposal the whole range of the corporeal works of mercy to specify and guide our actions.

Here it might be salutary to call to mind the proverbial truth that virtue is its own reward.

It is first and foremost the mercy of God we all stand constantly in need of. Much has been written by learned theologians over the years on the relation between the mercy of God and the justice of God. When God acts mercifully toward us, is He somehow putting justice aside, or, conversely, when He deals justly with us, does that mean that mercy has no role in the matter? The difficulties surrounding this question can be significantly muted if not removed altogether by remembering, in considering the question, that the theologians typically direct our attention to the fact that God is utterly simple, and thus there is no real distinction, in Him, between mercy and justice; those virtues, along with all the others we attribute superlatively to God--this being the way our finite minds interpret the multifarious effects of His divine action in the world-- are one and the same with the divine essence. Thus, in all God's dealings with us, there is never a separation, and therefore nothing by way of a conflict, between mercy and emotion, of entertaining the "right feelings" toward those justice. "Mercy does not take away justice," St. Thomas writes, "but is in a way the very plenitude of justice." There are of course deep mysteries that are to be acknowledged here and before which we humbly bow.

How might those two virtues, mercy and justice, relate to one another in our own attempts to act mercifully toward others? First of all, and obviously, those virtues are really distinct in us, which is not the case with God. Second, we need to be mindful of the important principle which tells us that the virtuous life is al of apiece: if a person is in genuine possession of one virtue, then he is in possession of all of them. To put the principle in negative terms, and apropos of the virtues of mercy and justice, if I lack the virtue of mercy, then I can lay no claim to the virtue of justice; and if I lack justice, I am not going to be one who is widely known for the liberal performance of works of mercy. ♦ Other Sacraments: no stipend applies





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


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
