

Little Things

Chesterton once wrote a book called Tremendous Tri- The importance of little things in the moral life is clearly fles, the kind of book that only the kind of man who was G. exemplified in something like the acquisition of virtue. A K. Chesterton could have written. It is a book about won-virtue is simply a good habit, and it would very much qualider, and about little things. The two, for Chesterton, were fy as a big thing. A good habit is not something that we closely allied, for he believed, and eh was quite correct in come by overnight. We have to work at it assiduously and this belief, that if we look closely enough at little things, so perseveringly, building it up bit by bit. If I lack courage and that we are able to wonder over them, we then discover, much to our pleasant surprise, that they are not so little after all. What we would otherwise be prepared to call trifles turn out to have tremendous significance.

What Chesterton was doing in his book was displaying the kind of wondering response to our world which the philosopher Aristotle considered to be the starting point of all serious philosophy, and all serious theology as well. To wonder mind, is simply to recognize it for what it is: the handiwork of God. Such wonder, if carefully cultivated, would eventually—we could almost say inevitably-lead the wondering human mind to God. "The heavens declare the glory of God," the Psalmist tells us, but so too, as William Blake discovered, does the grain of sand that lies cradled in the palm of your hand. For everything that exists, large or small, has but a single explanation for its existence, and that is God.

In Scholastic philosophy we make a distinction between the speculative intellect and the practical intellect. Such distinctions are important, but we must take care not to misinterpret them. Talk about the speculative and practical intellect is not meant to suggest that we have two intellects; in fact we have but one. However, we use that one intellect in two quite different ways. First, we know things simply for the sake of knowing them; the knowledge in question is valued for its own sake. Such is the speculative intellect at work. Secondly, we can know things in order that we might be able to put what knowledge we have to effective use. That is the approach of the practical intellect.

We could say that Chesterton was exercising his speculative intellect in showing his wondering interest in little things. He was displaying an essentially contemplative regard for God's creation. Now, of course, we can think practically, as well as speculatively, about little things, and in fact we must, for in the moral life, little things are the way to big things. Indeed, in more cases than not, they are the only way to the big things.

Perhaps one of the most potent temptations we have to face in the moral life is the one that tries to persuade us we can somehow circumvent the little things and go directly to the big things. But that is not how it works. And wasn't this just the message Our Lord was conveying to us when He cautioned that those who are not faithful in little things will not be faithful in the large? Why is that so? Part of the answer seems to be that the large things are nothing else than a to learn the rudiments of arithmetic. His flight will not even der-full events in human history. + begin. want to gain that virtue, I must proceed painstakingly, doing one small courageous act after another until finally I am in full possession of the virtue. I get to the big thing, the virtue, only through the little things. To be sure, one must, in the long term, think big, for after all it is virtue that is one's goal, but in the short term one must think small.

What does it mean, in practical everyday terms, to be guided by a consciousness of the overriding importance of little at the world, in the way Chesterton and Aristotle had in things? It means simply to tend dutifully to the business which has been given us to tend to. It means, in other words, to live our proper vocation. That vocation may not be an especially illustrious one, judging things as the world judges them, and such would be the case with most of us. But considering matters from the vantage point of faith, no vocation can be called unillustrious if it is truly yours. The highest vocation in the world, for you, is the one to which you have been called. The saints were not people who set their sights on doing "great deeds." They left that to the romantic adventurers. But because everything they did was done with such loving thoroughness, each of their deeds took on the dimensions of greatness.

> One of the heartening implications of the doctrine of the Mystical Body of Christ-which, alas, does not seem to be given today the kind of attention which it deserves-is that each and every one of us, whatever be our task, is, if we are doing that task faithfully and perseveringly, contributing to the great work that the Church has been commissioned to bring to fruition. Simply by being loyal to our vocation, within the confines of what might be a quite small world, we are doing our bit. In ways that we may not be able fully ot appreciate at the moment, we are contributing to the filling-out of the big picture, and the contribution we make, small though it may be, is one which no one else would be able to make.

> Ours is a religion which makes much of little things, but precisely for the sake of the big things. And there is wonderful paradox in this. We seek the lowest place, that we might be called up to a higher. We drop in our widow's mite and trump the ostentatious generosity of the millionaires. We decrease, so that He might increase. We lose our lives, so that we might gain them.

One cannot help but be struck by the quality of littleness that seemed to mark every aspect of the momentous event which took place in Bethlehem some two millennia ago. Everything was so low-toned and underplayed that the composition of the little things, so that fi you ignore the event, which meant everything to the world, took place little things you simple will fail to build up to the large without the world being aware of it. ♦ Other Sacraments: no stipend applies





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


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
